Job Descriptions

Camp Counselor (Buddy)

For every counselor willing to spend the entire week at camp, another camper is able to attend. Counselors arrive at camp the day before the campers to prepare the cabins and welcome the campers as they arrive. Each counselor is responsible for 2 campers in order to provide the very best care for our campers. **All counselors must take part in mandatory training sessions** (see training dates in training letter on website).

Counselors should be....

- 18 years or older
- Have a heart for children and God
- Willing to lead a short bible story/devotion with campers
- Willing to take part in activities with campers – swimming, boating, fishing, ropes courses, crafts, games, etc.
- Willing to spend majority of their week with 2 children ages 7 to 11

Staff

The different areas involved with being on staff include coach, drama, music, woodshop, activity centers, aunt and uncle, grandma and grandpa, bible story, dean of women and dean of men along with those just willing to lend an extra set of hands and counselor support throughout the week. While the counselors spend most of their time with their 2 assigned campers, staff members have the opportunity to interact with more of the kids. Staff members are there to lend an extra set of hands and/or be assigned to specific area. **All staff members must take part in mandatory training sessions** (see training dates in training letter on website).

Coach

Camp coach is responsible for coming up with fun action packed games to fill up a 30 minute period of time each day. Games need to be age appropriate and able to hold the attention of children ages 7 to 11. Games can be as simple as a game of baseball or wet and wild. Coach should plan on spending the day with the campers being their biggest fan and cheerleader! **All staff members must take part in mandatory training sessions** (see training dates in training letter on website).

Drama Team

Drama team puts on a short skit each evening during praise and worship time Monday – Thursday. Team typically needs to be made up of 4 to 5 people. All lines/Skits are provided from the Royal Family Kids' Camp curriculum to match the theme for each year. **All staff members must take part in mandatory training sessions** (see training dates in training letter on website).

Photographer

RFKC camp photographer will spend the week capturing all those positive memories RFKC campers are making throughout the week. Pictures will be taken all week long throughout each day at camp. Pictures will be printed at the end of the week and placed into photo albums for each camper to take home. **All staff members must take part in mandatory training sessions** (see training dates in training letter on website).

Activity Centers

Take part in one of the following centers throughout the whole week or create a new center that you would like to be a part of during the week at Royal Family Kids' Camp. Center ideas are beads, shrinky dinks, mad science, wood working, arts and crafts, dress up, game room, and fishing. Centers are not limited to the ideas listed. **All staff members must take part in mandatory training sessions** (see training dates in training letter on website).

Bible Story Teller

Volunteer/s would lead a short bible story Tuesday – Friday morning during breakfast club. Person or persons need to be able to lead the bible story in a creative way in which children ages 7 – 11 can take part and understand. The more of an active part the campers play in the bible story the better. Bible stories are pulled from the Royal Family Kids' Camp curriculum to match the theme of the week. **All staff members must take part in mandatory training sessions** (see training dates in training letter on website).

Leading Music

Music leader can be one person or a group. Music needs to be age appropriate for children ages 7 to 11. Music needs to be upbeat and include motions. Campers will take part in music during breakfast club in the mornings and each evening during praise and worship time. Music leader should come with 7 or 8 songs prepared for the campers to learn throughout the week. **All staff members must take part in mandatory training sessions** (see training dates in training letter on website).

Aunt/Uncle and Grandma/Grandpa

Royal Family Kids' Camp is created to help create a family atmosphere. Camp Aunt/Uncle and Grandma/Grandpa should be a happily married couple willing to spend a week at camp and just LOVE on our campers. It's a week to hand out hugs and show these campers just how much love we have for them. Aunt/Uncle and Grandma/Grandpa are also there to lend an extra set of hands when needed. **All staff members must take part in mandatory training sessions** (see training dates in training letter on website).

Nurse

Our camp nurses are always there to fix those tummy aches, bandage those booboos, and fix any ouchies we might receive while spending the week at Royal Family Kids' Camp. Our camp nurse is also in charge of passing out any medications. Nurses will be at registration helping check campers in and collecting medications along with helping check campers out and handing back over all medications. All nurses must be certified RNs. **All staff members must take part in mandatory training sessions** (see training dates in training letter on website).

Special Activities

Each evening at Royal Family Kids' Camp we hold a special activity. Activity normally lasts for about 2 hours. Activities held in the past have been carnivals, fishing night, makeovers, scavenger hunts, science guy, talent show, birthday party, Olympic Games, etc. Activities are not limited to any of the events listed. Volunteers for a special activity would only need to be at camp on the night of their activity. Activities need to be age appropriate for campers ages 7 to 11.

Birthday Party

One night of the week, we celebrate every child's birthday with a party in their honor. Birthday parties can be made up pony rides, bounce houses, inflated obstacle courses, balloons, clowns, petting zoo, cookie decorating, slip-and-slide, and fun birthday games. Of course there is always cake, ice cream and even a presents just for them! More help is always needed with all these events going on.

Volunteers for the birthday party can...

- Donate small prizes (yoyos, pencils, small stuffed animals, necklaces, sunglasses, etc. – no candy please)
- Collect items for the birthday bags
- Drive down to camp and help throw the birthday party

Registration

Those assisting with registration do not attend camp but are vital in welcoming our campers to this new experience. They will assist the director and other staff in checking campers in and loading them onto the bus. Many kids are often nervous and frightened and your smiling face will be the first one they see, before they even drive up to the camp.

Welcome Home Dinner

After a very exhausting but rewarding week at camp, staff and counselors are oftentimes emotionally drained, especially after having to say goodbye to their campers. The Welcome Home Dinner is a catered “thank you” meal for all the volunteers, giving them the opportunity to share stories and talk about some positive memories of their own.

Volunteers for the dinner are needed to serve the meal, decorate/set up, and clean up.

Training is unnecessary and it's a great way to be a part of camp without spending the week away.

Guide Relief

Come to camp for an evening and sit with campers while they fall asleep. Guide relief will sit in cabins with campers while counselors take a break, showers, etc. from 9:00 – 10:30. Guide relief is needed Monday – Thursday the week of camp. It's a great way to get your bible group, church small group or a group of friends involved in camp for an evening or two. You can sign up to help for a night or help the whole week.
